# Wet Weather Team Charge

- The Consent Decree requires stakeholder engagement on two items:
  - Funding plan for the Wet Weather Program
  - Public information, education, and involvement plan
- In addition, MSD seeks guidance on its investment choices in the overall design and implementation of the Wet Weather Program

# Examples of MSD's Investment Choices

- Infrastructure investments to increase storage and/or treatment capacity for the sanitary and combined sewer systems
- Investment in back-up power sources
- Frequency of cleaning, maintenance, and equipment repair/replacement
- Intensity of compliance inspection and enforcement activities
- Educational programs to prevent pollution
- Nonpoint source controls to limit water pollution

# Why Stakeholder Involvement is Important to the Wet Weather Program

- MSD's investment choices in the design of the Wet Weather Program will affect:
  - Water quality
  - Public health
  - Affordability of rates
  - Cost of development
  - Level of service provided to customers
- Stakeholders will help ensure that resources are used wisely to meet compliance obligations and address community needs

- > Stakeholders representing the following interests:
  - Business and industry
  - Community neighborhoods
  - Environmental advocacy
  - Environmental justice
  - Government
  - Organized labor
  - Public health
  - Recreation
- ~20-25 stakeholder participants

#### **WWT Process Overview**

- Structured, systematic process that occurs over two years (June '06 – May '08)
- Supported by a neutral, third-party facilitation team, with technical support
- Goal is to provide meaningful stakeholder input into MSD's Wet Weather Plan
- Process will be "consensus seeking"
- Result will be a better outcome for MSD and the community

# Wet Weather Team Proposed Meeting Rhythm

- Shorter (2-Hour) Meetings to Convene the Wet Weather Team and Share Information
  - June 6, 2006
  - July 20, 2006
  - August 15, 2006
- Longer (4-5 Hour) Meetings for the Values-Based Risk Management Planning Process
  - Every 4-6 weeks from Sept. 12, '06 through May 2008
  - From 4:00 PM to 8:00 or 9 PM with dinner provided
- Meetings held at different locations (for handson MSD system experience)

#### What Are the Steps in the Process?

- Step 1: Define Values (3 short & 2 full meetings)
- Step 2: Identify Risks (2 meetings)
- Step 3: Evaluate Risks (2-3 meetings)
- Step 4: Develop Risk Reduction Strategies (3-4 meetings)
- Step 5: Prioritize Risk Reduction Approaches (4-5 meetings)
- Step 6: Develop Risk Management Plan (2-3 meetings)

#### What Will Result from the Process?

- > At the end of the WWT process:
  - MSD will have a prioritized list of investment choices
  - Those choices will be the framework for MSD's Draft Wet Weather Plan
  - The Draft Plan will be sent to MSD's Board, and then will be finalized after a public review period
  - Final Plan will be sent to EPA by December 31, 2008
- > The Final Wet Weather Plan will:
  - Meet all compliance requirements
  - Attain the community's desired service levels
